forgive each other's weaknesses.

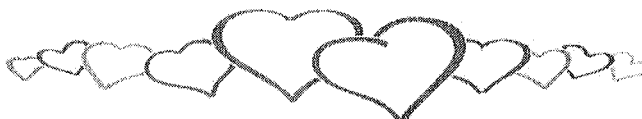

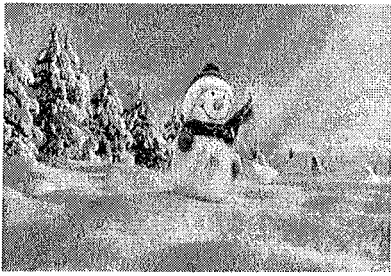

Breathe. Just breathe.

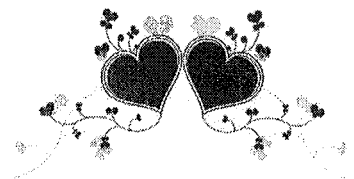

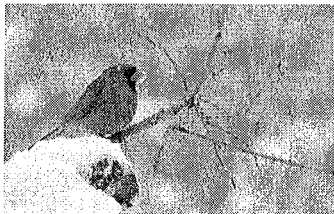

The Journey Continues...

For the past four months, a team of leaders from our church have been in discussion about how we can help St. Mark's become a better church. The first discussion we had was September 24th, 2022, when we attended a seminar called a "Church Vitality Workshop" sponsored by the Penn Central Conference. During that seminar, we met Joe Motz, the man who would be our coach and guide as we discovered the issues that are holding us back as a congregation. Joe has been an amazing asset for our leadership team and for our congregation. Every meeting we had with Joe, he had the courage to call us out and the wisdom to help us get deeper into the issues to find the sources of what holds us back. Through Joe's guidance, we discovered one of the biggest issues holding St. Mark's back is fear; specifically the fear of failure and the fear of conflict.

Since our discussions last September, I've become increasingly aware of (and very sensitive to) one of the causes of fear in our congregation. One of the main causes of fear is the result of negative voices that permeate through our congregation. I believe a majority of people at St. Mark's are positive and encouraging, and I am thankful for the positive energy they bring to our congregation. But just like a small pebble that works its way into the bottom of your shoe, just a little negativity can make the whole body uncomfortable.

There are legitimate times when we need to share what we are struggling with (like a health issue or dealing with the loss of a loved one). When those issues come up in our lives, we need to be there for one another. That is what the church is for. But the challenge we are facing is when trivial issues become reason for confrontation and attempts to bully others. Most of the issues these negative voices are complaining about are not "end of the world" events that are based in fact. Instead, they are opinion issues based on preference. The fear we have of confrontation or being accused of something has us paralyzed with fear. As such, we are unable to do the work of the church because we spend so much time trying to keep people from complaining.

As I mentioned in my Pastor's Report to our Annual Meeting, we have a lot of reasons outside the church to complain. We have a pandemic that doesn't want to go away, we have deep political divisions that are getting deeper every day, and violence is on the rise. Even activities that should be fun and relaxing (like eating at our favorite restaurant) aren't as enjoyable because most restaurants are short staffed and the service is slower. I get it: It is hard to have a positive attitude when there are so many things to be negative about.

But I've been thinking, with all of the negativity *outside* the church, do we have to bring that negativity into the church as well? Wouldn't it be nice if we could create a space at St. Mark's that is free from the negativity of the world? Wouldn't it be nice to have a place where we can be in fellowship with one another as we give God our thanks and praise and find the hope we need for the week ahead? I think it would be amazing if we could create a place like this, I think most of us are craving a place like this, so I have a plan for us to achieve that goal.

It is very simple: I challenge us to "T.H.I.N.K." before we speak or act. When we T.H.I.N.K. about what we say or do, we are asking ourselves:

To help us remember this thought, I've created a cut out below that you can put on your refrigerator at home. How this works is simple: as you "T.H.I.N.K." about what you're going to say, if the answer to any of the five questions is "no", then what you are about to say or do should be left unsaid or undone.

Our job as Christians is to give God our thanks and praise and to welcome our neighbor with our love. No where did Jesus teach us we should unload our anger on people or make them feel afraid so they will do what we want. If our goal is to speak and act positively as Christians, then our results will be positive as a church. I fully believe if we step up to the challenge of thinking, acting, and speaking positively in 2023, then we can grow stronger in our relationship with our Creator in the present, and our church will grow stronger to meet whatever challenges we face in the future. I hope you will join me on this journey of helping our church, and our relationships – with each other and with our God – to grow.

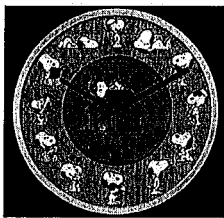

Carillon/Chime Update

Recently, the question was asked what would it take to repair/replace the carillon so we could use chimes during service and have music back in the neighborhood. That answer was found by our Music Coordinator, Jeff Clouser. The carillon company can no longer get parts to service our carillon. When asked what it would cost to replace with a new digital carillon, those estimates came in between \$20,000 to \$25,000. Therefore, we will not be replacing the carillon. What we are now researching is if the carillon can be disconnected from the organ and chimes hooked up so that the organ can play chimes. Stay tuned on this option as we get more information.

Simeon Guilford Part Two

While working on the Union Canal, Simeon Guilford, the engineer who directed the construction of the Union Canal Tunnel, discovered hydraulic cement near Stouchburg. This type of cement was used in the construction of locks and had to be transported to the area at much expense prior to the discovery. (Hydraulic cement hardens under water.) So great was this discovery that the company presented him with a 46 volume set of Reese's Cyclopedia.

Another discovery which Guilford made during his tenure in Lebanon was the acquaintance of a young girl named Catherine E. Doll, granddaughter of Judge Andrew Graff of Lancaster. At this time, water was lifted out of the Quittapahilla Creek by a forty-foot water wheel located along the stream just north of Lincoln Ave. and Cumberland St. and deposited in a trough forty feet in the air. This trough ran along Lincoln Ave. a half mile until it reached the canal. One day while home from school, Catherine and some friends climbed the trestles holding the trough, and once at the top became too frightened to descend. Hearing their cries for help, young Guilford and his workmen came to the rescue of the group. Your imagination can take the romance from here till the wedding of Simeon and Catherine in May 1830.

After the tunnel was completed in 1827, Simeon Guilford was appointed one of five principal engineers of the canal by the Board of Canal Commissioners and assigned to the Delaware line which extended from Bristol to Easton. He and DeWitt Clinton were also assigned to survey for the construction of a canal in the Susquehanna Valley. In less than a month he completed a survey of both sides of the river from Clark's Ferry to Northumberland. Guilford continued on the project until 1829 and then moved on to do surveys, located lines, and rendered estimates of proposed improvements.

About 1830 Guilford discovered Chestnut Hill iron ore on a farm near Columbia. This property along with three other deposits of hematite ore in Lebanon County, soon came under his ownership.

A year later he formed a partnership with Dr. George N. Eckert and erected Swatara Furnace near Suedberg in Schuylkill County. Here they manufactured charcoal, pig iron, and such castings as stoves, water pipes and the like. The furnace remained in operation until 1853. Having the branch of the Union Canal within a mile of the furnace made it economical to ship its products to market. The structure still stands today just inside the gates leading to Highbridge, Lebanon's water supply facilities.

In 1855, with such well-known citizens as John Krause, Jefferson Shirk, Gen. John Weidman, and Levi Kline, Guilford organized the Dudley Iron Co., an anthracite furnace in the western part of Lebanon (south of what is now Coleman Park). This furnace was later sold to Robert W. Coleman who changed the name to Donaghmore Furnace.

After retiring from the iron business, Guilford spent part of several years in Illinois supervising some land interests which he had acquired and investigating the coal formations of that state. He also enjoyed the study of geology, mineralogy, and other sciences.

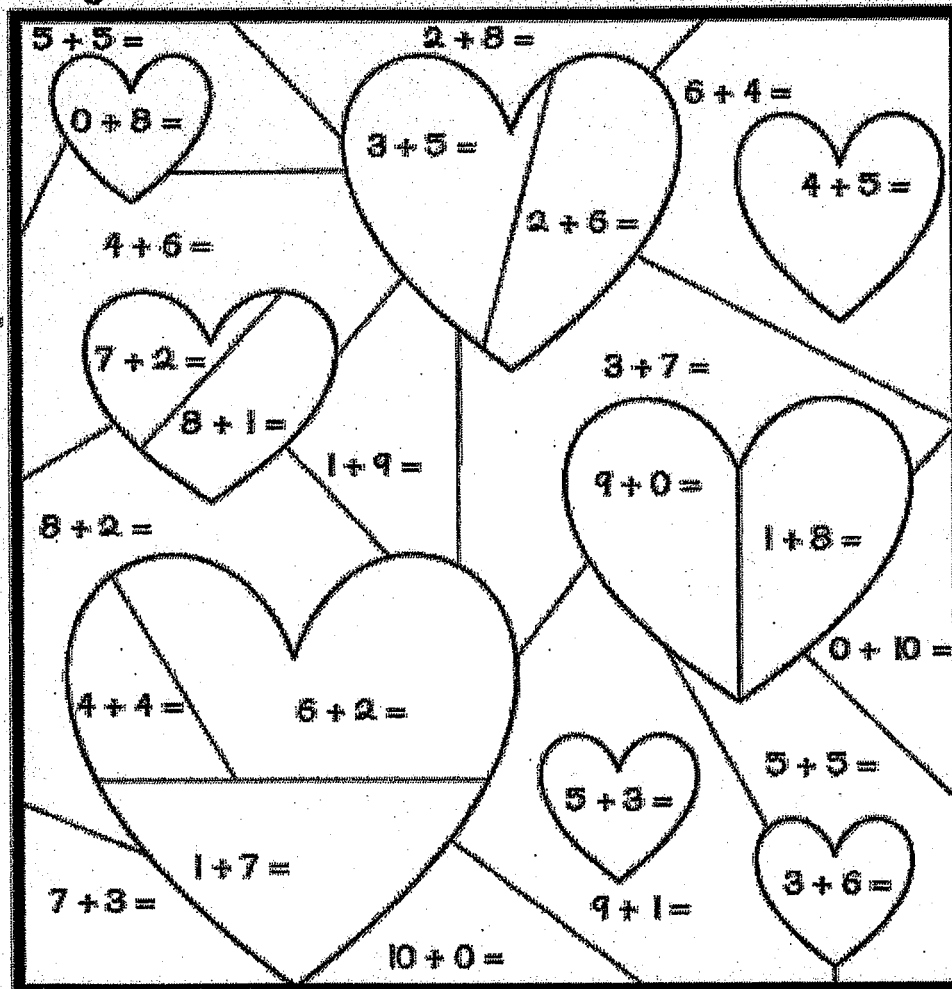
In 1843 Guilford received the nomination of the Wig Party for the office of Canal Commissioner, an office of great importance at the time of the state owned waterways. His bid for office was not successful, however.

He was elected Chief Burgess of the City of Lebanon (mayor) in 1855 and served for two years. Although retired, he stepped in as city engineer when public water was introduced into Lebanon and continued in that position until the work was completed.

One of his three sons, Dr. William M. Guilford, was present in 1932 at the dedication of the tablet and boulder which stands above the south portal along Tunnel Hill Rd. Dr. Guilford was given the honor of unveiling the boulder during the ceremony at which there were 2000 present. At the time he was 99 years old, just a month short of turning 100. (His life continued for another six years.)

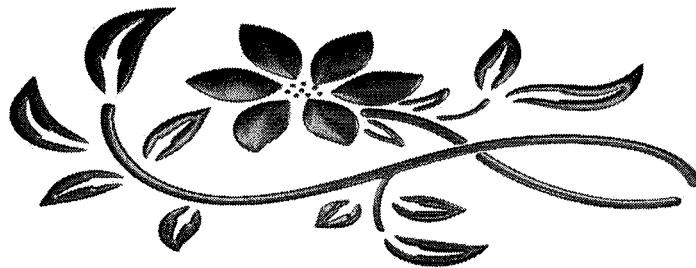

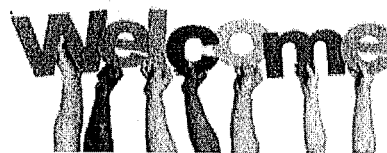

Meditations on Lenten Hymns (resource from the Calvin Institute of Christian Worship):

"Jesu, Jesu, Fill Us with Your Love"

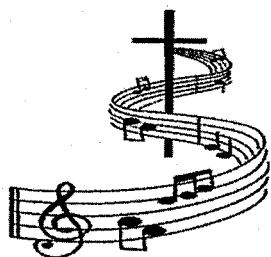
"In every age the church has a double task, to speak God's Word and to live God's life." This was the radical philosophy of Tom Colvin, author of "Jesu, Jesu, Fill Us with Your Love." This philosophy led him to be a missionary in Malawi, Ghana and inner city London. He was also associated with the Iona community for nearly 50 years before he died in his hometown of Edinburgh in 2000. Part of this work was to help the African church express itself in its own musical language and then help them bring their own unique worship expressions to the world church. His most famous hymn, and the one which best summarizes his life's work is "Jesu, Jesu." Notice the radical overturning of social norms: Jesus is the Master who acts as a slave, our neighbors are of all colors and found both near and far. What better hymn to sing as we approach the upper room, where Jesus dons a towel to serve his disciples?

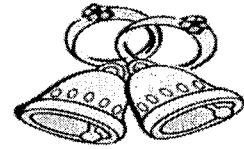
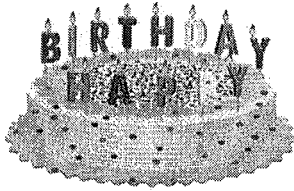
