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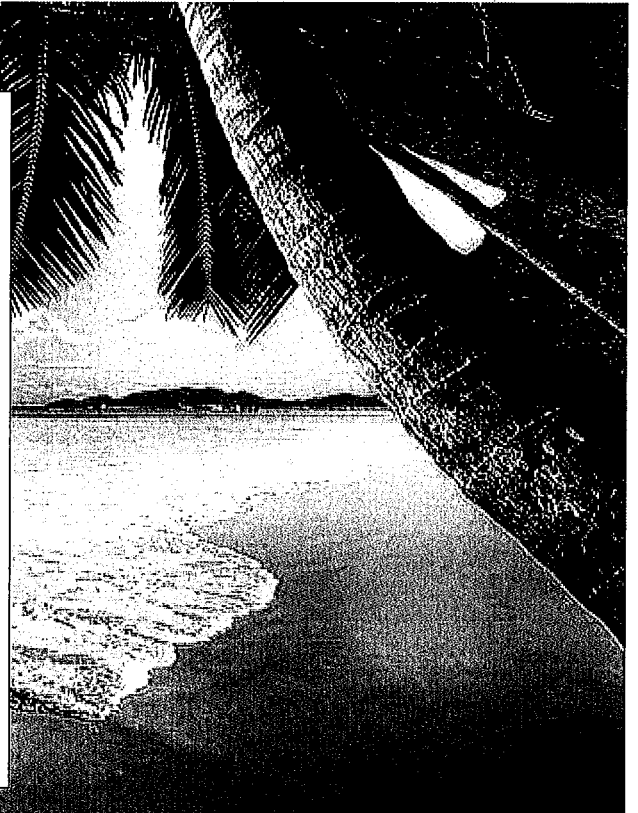

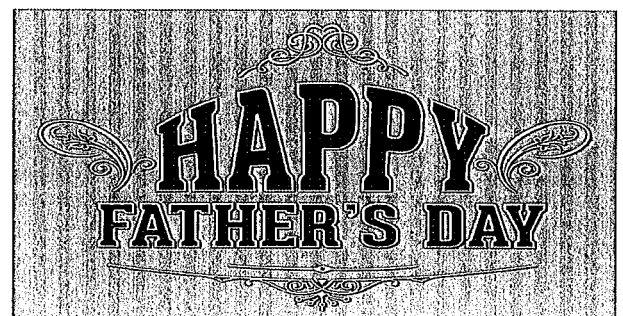

The Journey Continues...

Over a period of three days in September 2024, Hurricane Helene devastated western North Carolina. Hurricane Helene made landfall in Florida as a category 4 hurricane, and it raced inland until it stalled over the mountains of western North Carolina where it dumped three feet of rain in some areas. To put into perspective how much rain that is, if the same amount of rain had fallen as snow, there would have been 30 feet of snow! 30 feet is more than enough snow to completely bury a two-story house. While the people of North Carolina weren't dealing with snow, they were dealing with catastrophic flooding as the rain overwhelmed the banks of rivers and streams. The level of destruction they faced was heartbreaking. Even though Hurricane Helene hit 8 months ago, there are many businesses that are abandoned and homes that remain uninhabitable as a result of the flooding.

On May 18th, the Mission Team from St. Mark's came home from a successful trip to the epicenter of the destruction, Asheville, North Carolina. The mission trip a few weeks ago was the second time a Mission Team from St. Mark's traveled to Asheville to help those trying to survive and rebuild. Our first trip was this past November when the Mission Team delivered much-needed tents, propane stoves, heaters, generators, along with other important supplies. I didn't participate in the November trip, so I didn't get to see the damage in the immediate aftermath of the storm. From what I could see on our trip a few weeks ago, the good people of North Carolina have come a long way, but there is still a lot of work left to do. There are huge piles of debris that need to be picked up, there are countless buildings (both homes and businesses) that are damaged beyond repair, and there are plenty of washed-out roads that need to be rebuilt.

But the North Carolinians I talked to had a wealth of faith, hope and gratitude as they work to rebuild their lives and communities. While we were coming back from the job site on day one, I saw a message on a church sign that puts into perspective the attitude of gratitude I saw from the people we helped on this trip. The sign read: "Just look at what God can do." It *is* amazing what God can do, and to know that St. Mark's is a participant in the work God is doing is humbling and inspiring.

As I write this, I am watching the devastation in Kentucky from a series of tornadoes that touched down the night before. It is heartbreaking to see people in tears retell stories of how they survived the storm. I don't believe that God causes tornadoes and hurricanes to discipline us or teach us a lesson. What I believe is that Jesus called us to love our neighbors. And I believe God gives us opportunities to love our neighbors as we help them clean up, recover, and rebuild from the disasters we see almost everyday. We love our neighbors by offering gifts of time and treasure, but also through our gift of prayer. Because through prayer, God speaks to us, and God shows us how we can care for our brothers and sisters who need our help. No amount of effort is too great or too small. Everything we do matters. And when we participate in love, others see what God is doing through us. And there is no better path to follow, than the place God is calling us to go.

One of the things that I'm most proud of at St. Mark's is the mission type of work we do in order to make the lives of others a little better. For many years we've had a group adult and youth members go on a week long trip and do home repair and improvements to areas hit by natural disaster or simply poverty. We've now added a second "mini mission trip" this year to the Asheville, NC.

We've also had the youth and young adults do various projects in our area including yard clean up and landscaping at St. Mark's member's homes, work at Pine Acres, mulching at local parks, and baking cookies for our local police and first responders.

A few years ago we started doing a free community meal. We get a great turnout when we do the outside "picnic" in July/August. Our indoor "sit down" meals in May in the fellowship have had lighter attendance, however, on a positive note, we did serve 56 people during our community meal on May 3 which was an increase from 31 people that were served in May 2024. Let's try and get the word out there to our friends and community regarding these community meals. We have a great team of members that are willing and ready to serve (but we are always grateful for additional help). Let's take advantage of that and do all we can to publicize it and help our community.

Report of the Consistory - May 2025

The check for the Hoss's fundraiser was received and the proceeds were \$430.52. There have been enough contributions to the roofing project to make the first payment for the rubber roof. There will be a special congregational meeting on May 25, 2025, after the worship service to approve moving forward with the repairs. The day care provider has signed the lease to use the community room during the months of June, July and August for a day camp. The lease amount is \$500 per month. A Spanish congregation is interested in using the community room for worship but the scheduling with the day care may overlap. WB Music Therapy is interested in using some of the rooms in the church building for therapy for people with special needs. The age range is 5 to 75 years old. Discussion was held concerning a new pictorial directory and whether it would be printed or online. Further research will be done. The local NAACP will hold an event in Monument Park for Juneteenth on June 19, 2025. They have requested to borrow tables from Fellowship Hall. Pastor Jones will be in the building the day of the event and be available to the group as needed. Pine Acres does not have as many renters as last season. Many families no longer have reunions and older persons have difficulty maneuvering the grounds. A new John Deere riding mower was purchased to cut the grass on the grounds. 63 people were served at the community meal on May 3, 2025. The next meal is the picnic event scheduled for July 26, 2025. The interest was paid to the members that loaned money for the parking lot. One person requested to be paid out for the amount they loaned.

Hours worked for Hammer and Heart – 160

July 26th – community picnic in the church parking lot – Look for more information in the July carillon about how you can assist with the community picnic

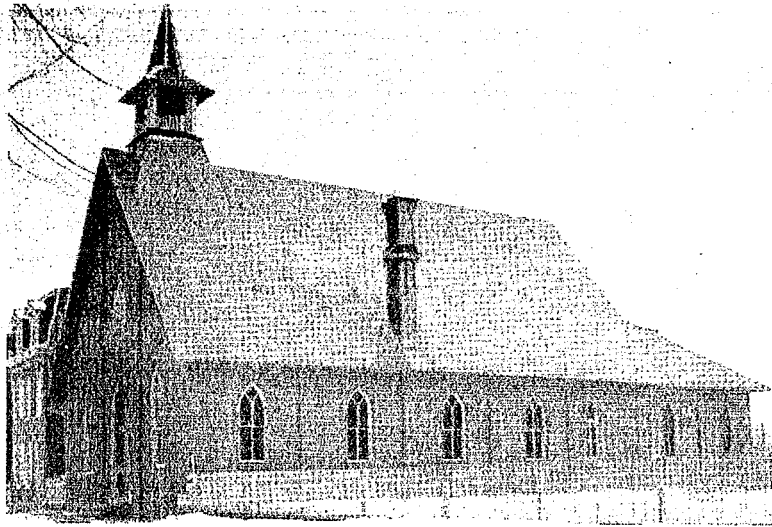

More Room Needed

Between the erection of St. Mark's Chapel and the construction of our present sanctuary, two major building programs took place. On March 1890, the congregation voted to erect a parsonage on the east side of the Chapel. Construction was begun immediately. The cost of the three-story brick building was approximately \$2300. While this project was underway, the "water closet" * was also repaired, painted, and given new shutters.

By 1893 the attendance, which was averaging 304, taxed the seating capacity of the small Chapel, and so the congregation voted to expand the building southward. At a cost of \$885 a new Lecture Room, 25 X 42 feet, was added. It was finished in hardwood, lighted by Welsbach lights, heated by hot air, supplied with the latest "improved chair settee", and matted through the aisles and around the pulpit platform. Dedication was held Sunday, November 4, with services in the morning, afternoon, and evening.



A year later a brick sidewalk was laid (probably along Mifflin Street) for only \$167.58, and the Ladies' Mite Society put a bathroom in the parsonage for which Pastor Fisher and his family were exceedingly grateful. The following article appeared in the ***St. Mark's Observer***, February 1897 concerning the sidewalk:

"A special effort was made by the Sunday School during the summer to raise funds for a pavement on the Mifflin Street side of the church property and for stone steps in front of the church (Chapel). About the beginning of June over 100 large oranges were distributed to all such as evinced any fondness for such fruit. These oranges were of an unusual variety. It was soon discovered that all of them had suspicious openings and that instead of allowing their owners to eat them as has been the custom hitherto they themselves commenced to eat. Some of them became very voracious and by the twelfth of August many of them were found to be so congested that it was determined to perform a desperate surgical operation upon them. This heroic treatment was found to permanently relieve the congested conditions of these yellow friends of ours and the exact result in dollars and cents was \$270.03, enough to pay the pavement, stone steps and some other improvements and leaving about \$100 for the improvement of the Sunday School library..."

(*You young ones, need to ask one of our senior members what a "water closet" is - or happily, WAS!)

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Oma's Rhubarb Cake

Ingredients:

Rhubarb Cake:

2 cups all-purpose flour
 1 ¼ cups white sugar
 1 tsp. baking soda
 ½ tsp salt

2 large eggs, beaten
 1 cup sour cream
 3 cups diced rhubarb

Streusel:

1 cup white sugar
 ¼ cup all-purpose flour

¼ cup butter, softened
 ¼ tsp. cinnamon

Directions:

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees. Grease and flour a 9x13 inch baking dish.

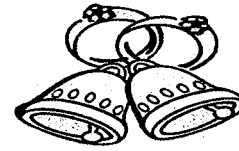
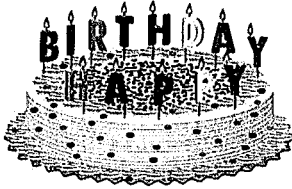
To make the cake: Stir together flour, sugar, baking soda, and salt in a large bowl.

Stir in eggs and sour cream until smooth, then fold in rhubarb.

Pour into the prepared dish and spread evenly.

To make the streusel: Stir together sugar and butter in a bowl until smooth, Stir in flour until mixture is crumbly. Sprinkle mixture on top of cake, then dust lightly with cinnamon.

Bake in the preheated oven until a toothpick inserted in the center comes out clean, about 45 minutes.
