The Journey Continues ...

When you think of the physical building of St. Mark's, there are two locations in our church that get used more than any other. By far, the most-used location has to be the Sanctuary. The Sanctuary is where we gather Sunday morning to worship God, to pray, to sing, and to hear scriptures as we give God our thanks and praise. When we have special services like weddings or funerals, we gather in the Sanctuary. When we have choir practice, we rehearse in the Sanctuary. I could go on, but the point is: the Sanctuary is the location where we spend a lot of our time, right?

The second most popular location at St. Mark's has to be the Fellowship Hall. In the Fellowship Hall we hold meetings, Bible Studies, small group gatherings, Consistory workshops, and retreats when it is too cold or rainy to meet at Pine Acres. And most importantly, the Fellowship Hall is where we gather to eat. We've had some epic potluck dinners over the years in the Fellowship Hall, haven't we? And recently, we've been holding Thanksgiving, Christmas, and Easter dinners down there, too. Lots of great memories and awesome meals have been shared around the tables in our Fellowship Hall.

Speaking of the Fellowship Hall, have you taken a look down there lately? If you haven't, then you need to take a look. There has been a lot of work invested into updating one of the most used spaces at St. Mark's. A hard-working crew of volunteers has been cleaning, prepping, repairing, and painting the walls. The curtains are being cleaned and the drafty windows are being repaired. After April 1st, the floor will be getting a much-needed stripping and waxing. All of that work is going to feel like a breath of fresh air.

Do you know where the idea to update the Fellowship Hall came from? It was an idea from the youth and young adults. And for the record, I think it's a great idea to update a room that was *long* overdue to be updated. And I'm thankful these young people had the courage to share their idea along with the willingness to make their idea a reality. And I'm grateful for the time and effort they've put in, too. They not only came up with the idea, but they believed in the idea enough to invest their time for the benefit of everyone who meets in that space.

At the Annual Meeting this past January, an idea was shared to have the Sanctuary painted. I think that is a great idea – and an idea that's long overdue, too – so I strongly support repainting the sanctuary and I encourage us to take that idea and make it a reality. Truth is, I am in support of any effort to improve our church – so long as it is logistically and financially feasible, of course – because I believe we should always strive to give God our best.

Some of the ideas we come up with – like painting the Sanctuary – are pretty big projects, so they are going to require some thoughtful planning. But they can still be done. Other projects – like painting Fellowship Hall – can be tackled with the resources and effort of our own members. But we need to know what your ideas are, so that the ideas can turn into projects, and the projects turn into improvements that help improve the spaces where we gather to worship and learn about God.

So what say you, friends and members of St. Mark's? What would you like to see at the place where we worship God? How can we improve on what we already do, so that we can be even prouder of the building where we give God our thanks and praise? And let's think beyond a fresh coat of paint (although that is a great place to start!), because nothing we do for the glory of God is too good for God. And besides, we'll never know the difference one idea can make, until we plant the seed and see what grows.

The Great Flood of Lebanon County

The storm of 1862 which practically spelled disaster for the Union Canal occurred on June 4 of that year. Forming in the Susquehanna Valley where the river breaks through the mountains north of Harrisburg, it followed the ranges east. The storm grew more and more violent as it moved through Schuylkill County and on to the head water of the Lehigh. As the incessant rain fell, the head waters of the Swatara began to swell rapidly and funnel the torrents of liquid into the restricts of man - dams and reservoirs - which had been constructed along the waterway to provide for the ever-thirsty canal as well as power the mills along its banks. But the human efforts were no match for the fury of nature. What lost its hold first, man will never know.

What did give was Berger Reservoir two miles above Pinegrove sending a wall of water down toward the Lebanon Valley. With it came grist mills, saw mills, feeder dams along with bridges and the banks of the canal itself. Whether it reached the Big Dam or Main Reservoir while it was still intact is uncertain although speculation has it that this structure was gone by the time this wave reached the gap.

A reporter writing in the *Lebanon Courier* of June 12, 1862, writes, "The county (as well as some township) bridges were all swept away, not even leaving the piers standing, so complete was the destruction. The woods along the creek are filled with piles of wood, pieces of bridges, logs, green trees, stumps, and fragments of fences, pig pens, sheds, parts of saw mills, furniture, stray pieces of wrecked boats, boards, shingles, and almost everything that can float can be found - dead cattle, sheep, hogs, etc. Some heaps are as large as ordinary two story houses."

The same article gives this account of the storm's rage and destruction as experienced by Mr. Raymond Lewis who lived along the canal and river. 'At about dusk I arrived home, leaving my boat in Finninggan's Dam, about one-half mile distant from my house. I could not cross the dam. I came up home, and found the water rising rapidly; visited the Union Forge; came across the Swatara and canal bridge; doing a little work about home. I returned to my boat, passing Boughter's and Dave Brunner's houses. After staying a short time in my boat, I went to David Brunner - it now being a little after 11 o'clock, Wednesday evening. I told him that the Big Dam would certainly break; that the water was rising very fast. Mr. Brunner replied that he thought that it (the water) would soon begin to fall. I desired him and his family to come with me, as I felt certain that they were in danger. With this I left and came past William Boughter's about 100 yards below my residence and 700 yards from David Brunner's; all living along the canal. After I came home I told my wife to leave the house, and directed her to go to one of my neighbors where I supposed she would be safe. At this time there was no water in my yard, though still She immediately left. I thought it my duty to appraise Mrs. Boughter and her family of the impending danger and endeavor to save them if possible. After having failed to reach the house over the canal bank - the water having cut through the bank already - I tried to reach them through my field; but finding I could do nothing for them, I became anxious for my own safety. I returned and concluded to go to my house, and thought also of untying my horse, cattle, etc.; but finding that my position became more perilous every moment, I left with a lantern in hand, to follow Mrs. Lewis. This was about 1 o'clock on Thursday morning. Having gone about 200 yards through my field where it was never before known to have been swept by water, I was all of a sudden sent with a rush of water about 4 1/2 feet breast which nearly knocked me over. Finding it impossible to continue against the water, which was very turbulent, and loaded with brush, fence rails, stumps, trees, and other pieces of lumber, I turned immediately and thought of a large hickory tree that was standing some distance down the field. I kept my light and went with the water, unable to stop for a moment, or even turn to get the exact course to reach my tree - my only earthly hope of safety, but thanks to Providence, I came right up the tree. I caught hold of it and threw away my lantern. I had held on to it for some time, trying to shield myself from logs, timber, etc. coming along, when I found that my overcoat which I had thrown over my shoulders and tied in front with a piece of twine, was getting so heavy that one time I thought I had to let go and certainly drown, not being able to tear it open with my one hand; but a few moments more, I would have been compelled to

yield, when a large log temporarily lodged against the tree; I at once got on it and tore off my coat and threw it away, which relieved me. The log again began to move; I grasped the tree. Here I could see going down the stream, bridges, boats, trees, parts of housed, barns, and fences, and also near the voices of some of those who were lost. When Mr. William Boughter's house went, I was so much shocked that I came near losing my hold, knowing that the whole family would perish. At this time a large log struck me (Mr. Lewis was badly bruised on his back and limbs from the timber, and it is a miracle that he finally escaped) nearly forcing me away. After this I felt cold and became benumbed and partially unconscious, having at no time called for help or assistance during my perilous situation, knowing that I could receive no possible aid. Towards morning I felt sleepy, and think from pure exhaustion, I dozed while standing at the tree, and when I was found, I could not leave my hold go at once, my fingers being perfectly locked into each other; the water was still up to my breast. I was taken home, and thanks to God I have been spared from a dreadful, and as I thought more than once during the long night, certainly death."


Mr. Lewis' damage was about \$1200 having lost a mule, a colt, 4 cows, calves, 16 head of sheep, hogs, and all his out building. His barn was moved some distance into the field. One horse, a mule and two cows were gotten out after the flood, still being tied to their troughs. The water in his house was about five feet on the first floor. His fine orchard was completely destroyed.

Meanwhile, Mr. William Boughter's family, consisting of Mrs. Boughter, her two sons, one about 1 1/2 and the other 6 years, with a young girl living with them, aged about 12 years - daughter of Elias Behney - Mr. & Mrs. David Brunner and a Miss Boughter, aged about 16 years old were in the house when it was taken away by the water. Mr. Brunner and lady and girl having left their house for safety, and having to go through the water nearly up to their shoulders, it being back water, consequently not so strong. After arriving at Mr. Boughter's, the water was two feet on the first floor. Soon they could no longer remain below and when they (now seven of them) went upstairs, and were not up more than 15 minutes when the water was up to their necks. The terrible and agonizing screams of the women and children were dreadful when the painful truth rushed upon their souls, that no earthly aid could possibly reach them and that they were inevitably doomed to perish. The house by this time began to tremble and rock for a moment, when with an awful crash it went down, up again, and over, and the roof breaking enabled Mr. Brunner to make his escape swimming to a plank. He went down the current for a mile or so, caught hold of a tree, by which he saved himself, being taken out in the morning by a small boat. Al the rest perished, their bodies having been recovered within two and three miles from the house where they were drowned with the exception of Mrs. Brunner. Some of the bodies were nearly covered with sand, brush, leaves, etc. while others were in heaps of drift wood.

At the same time Mr. & Mrs. James Proudfoot, living near the Union Forge, and their two daughters, Isabella and Martha, of the respective ages of 16 and 19 years, and two smaller children were left in their house. They left when the water was only coming to their door. As it appears, Mr. Proudfoot, his lady and daughters detained themselves a little too long, when the large wave coming on them, took them away when they were still alongside of their fence. Mr. Proudfoot made three unsuccessful efforts to retain Martha, but was compelled to let her go. He escaped. Mrs. Proudfoot was found the next morning some hundred yards from her house, as well as Isabella. Martha, it seems, got hold of some drift wood, and floated to near the Forge, one fourth mile, when she called to some boatmen near the water, "Save me! Save me! and soon after was buried in the angry flood. The second morning after that her body was found in a large pile of wood, planks, etc., near the place where she was last heard."

The storm had completely destroyed the branch canal in just a few hours. As the water moved through the system on toward the Susquehanna, the western branch of the canal also received substantial damage and was closed the remainder of the year leaving only light traffic from the summit east. The branch canal from Jonestown north was never to be rebuilt, and with it went the water reserves which the canal so desperately needed.

Beat 2 eggs.

2 (11 ½ oz.) cans mandarin oranges

2 tsp baking soda

2 C. granulated sugar

1/2 tsp. salt

2 c. flour

Beat at low speed for 4 minutes. Pour into greased and floured 9x13 inch pan.

Bake at 350 degrees for 30 to 35 minutes.

Bring to boil:

34 c. brown sugar 3 Tbsp. milk

2 Tbsp. butter

Pour over hot cake as soon as it comes from oven.



I would like to take this opportunity to thank you for your prayers, cards, and emails as I continue my leave of absence to recoup and recover from my illness. The recent poem received from parishioners encouraging me not to quit the fight was a welcome reminder as I continue to work hard to heal in spite of the yo-yo of successes and setbacks. I appreciate the continued kindness, grace, and support shown by the church, congregation, Personnel Committee and




Consistory and thank Ken, Peg, Heidi, Kathy, and Cindy for stepping in as needed. I'm also thankful for the accommodations that have been made so I can continue to contribute to the music ministry. My doctors and I are still trying to figure out what medication will work for me to address my mental and physical health. Medication side effects have definitely impaired my physical and cognitive abilities as we have been constantly trying different medication combinations to control the anxiety and panic disorder as well as the agoraphobia and ocd. These side effects continue to impact my daily living as good days continue to be allusive. Besides medication management from my psychiatrist, my therapists are helping me to work on facing fears/pushing boundaries that are sustainable through exposure therapy, continue to help me address safety behaviors, and work on processing thoughts before they turn into a panic situation. But my biggest hurdle continues to be finding the right medicine that doesn't make me ill and addresses my severe anxiety. Hopefully therapy will also help me overcome this anxiety. Unfortunately this part of the treatment is a marathon and not a sprint as retraining the brain and nervous system takes time. Your continued prayers for good days are appreciated.
