



### The Journey Continues ...

As I sit down to gather my thoughts for this month's *The Journey Continues*, it feels like there is a lot of uncertainty in the air. There always seems to be uncertainty on the world stage with ongoing wars and rumors of wars, and there is uncertainty in our country with rising violence, and there is uncertainty due to the weather. But these days, even our churches are facing uncertainty as they try to figure out what the "new normal" is after the pandemic. For fans of professional football (like me), there is uncertainty because the week I am writing these words is the week of the NFL Draft. By Saturday evening of this week, 259 players will be selected to play for one of the 32 teams in professional football. I usually keep an eye on the Draft to see which players the Steelers add to their team, but this year is the first year I know someone who is eligible (and likely) to be selected in the draft. Truth is, many of us know Chad Ryland. What we don't know is which team he will be playing for by the end of this week, which is why we (and especially the Ryland's) feel a level of uncertainty.

Like everything else in life, the NFL Draft is an inexact science. No one knows which players will go to what team, nor do they know how good (or how bad) a player is going to be after they are drafted. For months now, the "experts" have been offering their opinions, but the truth is, the "experts" aren't any better at guessing than we are. For example, the greatest NFL player of all time, Tom Brady, was the 199<sup>th</sup> player selected in 2000. Tom Brady ended up playing 22 seasons in the NFL and he won more Super Bowls than any player in history. But incredibly, 198 players were selected before him because no one saw (or believed) how good of a player he would be. On the other end of the spectrum, one of the worst draft picks in NFL history was the 1<sup>st</sup> player selected in 2007: JaMarcus Russell. The draft "experts" were unanimous in their assessment that JaMarcus Russell was going to be a great player. He was big, strong, and he had an arm like a cannon. But JaMarcus was such a disappointment as a player (he only won 9 games), he barely lasted 2 ½ years in the NFL.

But it's not just the NFL Draft where there is uncertainty. Life is so full of uncertainties, all we can do is focus our attention on what is right in front of us. Think about it this way (and I'll use Chad Ryland kicking a football as an example): imagine Chad is on the practice field kicking 50 yard field goals. There is no one else around. It's just Chad, the ball, and the uprights. Everything feels really good and he nails one kick after another. Now let's imagine Chad is playing in the Super Bowl. There are 4 seconds left in the game and Chad is lining up a 50 yard field goal to win the game. A kick to win the Super Bowl with millions of people watching is going to seem harder than kicking a field goal on the practice field in the off season. But why? The uprights haven't changed, the football looks the same, the distance is the same, everything is the same. But the difference is the atmosphere. The atmosphere changes everything and creates uncertainty, doesn't it?

Or, does it? Think about it. If everything but the atmosphere is the same, then what a Super Bowl winning kick comes down to Chad and the kicking motion he has practiced thousands of times before. Now Chad will probably feel nervous because this is a once in a lifetime moment, and he doesn't want anyone to be disappointed. I get that. I wouldn't want to disappoint people either. But whether Chad makes or misses the field goal to win the Super Bowl, he will always be a child of God, he will always be loved by God, he will always be loved by his parents, and he will always be supported by his church family. None of that is going to change. So he can go out there and kick that ball knowing that the truly important things in life are already firmly established.

The same goes for all of us and the uncertainty we face on our journey through life. We can be certain we will always have God's love in our lives. Nothing we do (or don't do) in this world is going to change that. I would imagine the vast majority of us will never have the opportunity to line up a kick that could win the Super Bowl, but we still face times when we feel overwhelmed by the circumstances of life. Know this: you are a child of God and you are unconditionally loved by God. So even when the uncertainties of life come at us, let them come. Because we can always be certain about God and God's love for us.

# Canvass White Third Chief Engineer of the Union Canal

Canvass White was born in Whilestown, New York in September 1790, just a year before Robert Morris and his group of investors received a charter to build the S & S Canal, later to become the Union Canal. He was described as a talented and inquisitive lad who enjoyed inventing and constructing necessities for his hometown. He was, however, prone to illness, and at the age of 21 set out on a seagoing voyage as a means of restoring his failing health. Upon returning three years later, White became a student at Fairfield Academy where he studied mathematics, science, and surveying.

Sometime during his schooling Canvass decided to participate in the assault on Fort Erie. During the event he was wounded by a gunshot. Lieutenant White pursued those responsible for his wounds and was successful in capturing most of them. Satisfied by success, White returned to his studies at Fairfield.

During this time, work was commenced on the Erie Canal. New York Governor DeWitt Clinton realized the need for civil engineers, especially those knowledgeable in the construction of canals. No such formal education in this field was offered in America at this time. Gov. Clinton recruited Canvass White, a new employee of the Erie Canal construction, to visit England in 1817 for the purpose of learning about the materials and tools used to construct canals, bridges, aqueducts, and culverts. After walking over 2000 miles examining canals, White returned home in 1818 with the latest surveying devices and knowledge of the construction of English canals. One primary feature of this construction was the use of natural or hydraulic cement, a material which hardens underwater.

The English cement would have been too expensive to be shipped from Europe, but White was able to locate rock suitable for the manufacturing of natural cement in north central New York. Within a few years this cement was being produced in several states including Pennsylvania. Canvass White and his brother Hugh were the first to begin commercial production in North American in 1819 and received a patent for this product a year later. Unfortunately others began production as well, and White was unable to protect his patent rights and finally sold them to the State of New York in 1825 for \$10,000.

In 1823, White left the employment of the Erie Canal and assumed the responsibility for completion of the Union Canal which had been under the direction of Loamini Baldwin until his dismissal a year before. With him came three assistant engineers, George Olmstead, Sylvester Welsh, and one Simeon Guilford.

With White's guidance the construction took several new turns. The original canal was to run from the Tulpehocken through the Summit and on through Lebanon to the Swatara. These two creeks were to be dredged and improved so that navigation would be in these two channels as they moved east and west. White suggestion was that the canal continue parallel to these two creeks until they reached Reading on the east and Middletown on the west. As the canal crossed the Summit (Lebanon), it was to be within the Quittapahilla. The problem White wanted to avoid was the closing of the ten mills which derived their power from this stream. The canal company would then have to assume the damages for the closing of these mills.

It must be remembered that the first engineer, William Weston, had changed the route from the Quitty to run north of Maple Street and Tunnel Hill Road. Loamini Baldwin brought the

route back to the Quittapahilla. Now with the guidance of Simeon Guilford, his assistant engineer, the path of the canal was to run south of Maple Street, tunnel through Gravel Hill (on which Tunnel Hill Rd. runs), and head for the Swatara. White angled the canal line slightly south into Avon then northwest to meet Baldwin's cut before moving westward. Their hope for a more northern route rather than the Quitty was also to catch the southern edge of a shale formation that extends all the way to the Blue Mountains. Had they followed Weston's route their objective of having a less porous shale base would have been more successful. Did they wish to be more accessible to the developing community of Lebanon and thus chose the southern route through the Borough of North Lebanon? Their reasoning has as yet been undiscovered.

With White came his hydraulic cement shipped from his operations in New York State. This supply continued until Simeon Guilford located a natural supply locally saving the canal company the cost of transportation. To show their gratitude, the managers of the Union Canal Company presented Mr. Guilford with a set of encyclopedias.

Under White's direction the Union Canal had a width of 36 feet at the waterline with the bottom of the prism being 24 feet. The tow path was situated 18 inches above the waterline, and all trees and roots were removed to a distance of 45 feet from the center of the canal. He also saw to it that the ditch under the seat of each bank was puddled 36 inches wide and 12 inches deep, and lined with clay.

The chief engineer became ill in 1826 and was forced to resign from his active duties. Although he recovered and was able to work a few more years, he was told by his physician to move south in the autumn of 1834. He sailed to St. Augustine, Florida but passed away less than a month after his arrival. He now rests in a churchyard in Princeton, New Jersey.

James Worrall, the engineer who would later enlarge White's canal, summed up the life of Canvass White in this one sentence: "In his day, he stood at the head of American Canal engineering, and his strength lay in his cool practical judgment...a gentleman of very quiet manner, equal temper, and kind disposition."

And so after 36 years of financial struggle and with the direction of three chief engineers, the Union Canal was finally completed in 1827 and opened officially a year later. With the cost of the enlargement which followed in the 1850's the Union Canal Company invested over six million dollars in this new transportation system. Was it worth the expense? Not financially, for those who invested in the company never realized much return on their dollar and their stock in the end was almost worthless. Did this community and the state gain from the venture? Most certainly. Lebanon's north side grew up along the canal, industry flourished with a cheap transportation system, the Colemans expanded their industrial empire. The interior of Pennsylvania was opened to the markets of the Philadelphia area. The coal industry of Schuylkill County was able to fire the industrial revolution. A pathway to the West was forged. Our new nation grew on its way to becoming a world power.

It's now our responsibility to preserve the foot prints of this small but important waterway for future generations to appreciate. It's our responsibility to share its importance to the history of the Lebanon Valley. Thank you for being part of this effort.


