



Report of the Consistory - October 2023

Pastor Jones and his wife will prepare both Thanksgiving and Christmas dinner for members who do not have a meal planned with family or friends. The dinner will be served in Fellowship Hall on both holidays. A family from the church has pledged to match up to \$3,000 for offerings that are made by members designated as matching now until the end of the year. They can be made in the small brown envelopes in the pews or marked as matching in the memo line of a check. Confirmation classes have started and three youth are participating. The Mission Team will share memories and pictures from this year's trip at the service on Sunday, October 29, 2023. A breakfast will be served prior to the service. The team received a thank you note from the woman whose home they repaired. The Pine Acres committee received a \$5,000 grant from Penn Central Conference. The grant will be used to take down dead trees and to repair a piece of playground equipment damaged by insects. The Thanksgiving Eve service will be held Wednesday, November 22, 2023, at 7:30pm. 

Exploring the Summit Part 1


The Summit of the Union Canal is defined for this article as from Lock 1E located in what is now Calcite Quarry along Rt. 422 east of Lebanon to Lock 1W which is just beyond the western boundary of the north side of Union Canal Tunnel Park. While Lebanon sits in a valley, it is also the summit or high ground between the Schuylkill & Susquehanna Rivers. The canal dropped close to 300 feet from the Summit to the Schuylkill at Reading and 200 feet down to where the Swatara enters the Susquehanna at Middletown. The Summit of course was surmounted by a series of some 92 locks between the two rivers.

The first of the artifacts on the Summit to the west is the Union Canal Tunnel situated in the park. Drilled through solid rock by hand (1825-1827), it remains the oldest Transportation Tunnel in the U.S. today. The first restoration work on the tunnel took place in 1934 by the Civil Works Authority, a program putting individual to work following the Depression. The last restoration efforts were performed between 1998 and 2000 hopefully ensures that this National Historic Landmark will stand for years to come. Only a ride through this edifice will do it justice, so visit the park this summer for an excursion.


The second remnant of the Union is the canal itself. The Friends were able to have the section located in the north side of the park dredged and made navigable after the opening of the tunnel itself. From 25th St. to Minnich Lane - the NW end of the Park, one can travel 5/8th of a mile on this waterway which is the only section navigable of the original 82 miles. Not too many years ago the canal extended to 22nd St. in West Lebanon, but

this was later turned into Union Canal Dr. which brings visitors into the south side of the park.

Entering the canal on the north side of the park is Clark's Run or Cattail Run (or Kettle Run) - the name has changed over the years.

This stream flows out of another remains of the canal, Lions Lake. This reservoir was created in 1866 when the Branch Canal was lost due to a storm near Pine Grove. The rain filled the reservoir there which broke sending a wall of water south destroying all the dams and the canal along the way. The cost of reconstructing the Branch Canal was too prohibitive at that time and so this later construction (Lions Lake or Lights Dam) was built to collect water for the western section of the canal on the Summit.

Located just north of town on Rt. 72 on the north side at Jay St., the dam has been rebuilt in recent years creating a pleasant recreation area. If you visit this

location, read the plaque to learn the original name of the reservoir.

A must stop on the Summit is 9th and Maple Streets to see the house which stands on the northeast corner. This was constructed of lock bricks taken from the original 1792 locks built under the direction of William Weston. These were the locks which President Washington viewed when he visited Tulpehocken Manor that same year.

These first locks were made of brick and didn't hold water very well. They had fallen into disrepair over time and were replaced by sandstones ones when the canal was finally finished. The bricks were later hauled to Ninth & Maple and the house constructed as a

residence for the superintendent and an office for the canal. Today the bricks have been stuccoed so they cannot be seen.

To the east of this building is the retirement home of the first superintendent, William Lehman. It has been carefully restored to what it was like in the mid 1800's and is on the market today for your purchase!

SNICKERS APPLE SALAD

Ingredients:

3.4 ounces instant vanilla pudding mix6 Granny Smith apples, reserve 1 for garnish

6 Snickers bars full size bars, reserve 1 for garnish

1/4 cup caramel sauce (Optional)

34 cup whole milk 8 ounces Cool Whip

Instructions:

- 1. In a large bowl, whisk together the vanilla pudding and milk until smooth & creamy. Fold in the Cool whip.
- 2. Core and chop all but one of the apples. Toss with lemon juice or 7-up if making this salad in advance. Pat dry.
- 3. Chop all but one Snickers into bite sized pieces.



A word from your Music Ministry Coordinator:

I would like to take this opportunity to thank you for your prayers, cards, and emails as I continue to recoup and recover from my illness. Although you have seen me in church trying to do what I love, I am in no way back to 100% health so I appreciate the continued kindness, grace, and support shown by the church, congregation, Personnel Committee and Consistory, as well as, Ken, Peg, Heidi, Kathy, and Cindy for stepping in when needed. At this



time both my Psychiatrist and PCP feel that the antidepressant/anti-anxiety medicine I've been on for many years is no longer working. Not sure why. COVID? Who knows. I still experience this anxious feeling which seems to cause this terrible unpleasant stuck/gag feeling in my throat making me more anxious to eat and swallow. Since May we have tried just about everything to supplement the medication with other meds but to no avail. This means they want to wean me off my current med and try something else. The withdrawal effects can be really cumbersome and make it impossible for me to function well. I tried to avoid this at all cost but it appears I don't have much of a choice. So, in the spirit of transparency, please be prepared for my absence for a couple of weeks as I work through this transition and any side effects/withdrawal symptoms that may occur as I try new medication along with therapy, swallow study, and a visit to the ENT specialist. Please pray that I can handle this transition and remain calm and comfortable as can be. This is uncharted territory for me and I'd be lying if I didn't say I was a bit fearful. Thank you for your understanding and continued support as I concentrate on my health so I can recover

and readily return to doing those things that bring me joy. I wish this wouldn't have to be but for some reason it is where I find myself now. Please know I'm trying my best to overcome this so I can be among my friends and family which I miss dearly. This has been a daunting and exhausting time for me so your continued prayers are appreciated.


